What's New in Roselawn?

A is for Ahimsa – Art About Nonviolence – Opening Reception September 11, 5:00 –9:00 p.m. Roselawn Center Building, 7390 Reading Road (formerly Showcase Furniture) Exhibition continues September 12 – 25, 2004, M-F, 1:00 – 8:00 p.m., Saturday, 10:00 – 8:00, Sunday 10:00 – 8:00 p.m.

The RCC is hosting its first-ever art exhibition in September. Each starting with a blank canvas, 25 regional artists representing a broad spectrum of cultural diversity, age, background, and ethnicity have been commissioned to produce paintings addressing the theme of *ahimsa*, a Sanskrit word embodying the concept of respect for all living things. They will be joined by seven additional artists working in ceramics, stone, steel and enamel. A complete list of artists is available on our website, www.Roselawn.org.

The gallery site, at the corner of Reading and Section Roads, has undergone an extreme makeover as many stalwart volunteers have seized the opportunity to make this exhibition happen. The mission is to stimulate conversation about how we create the society we live in by examining Ahimsa – Nonviolence through the eyes of the artists. Refreshments at the opening will be provided at no charge by The Coffee Emporium Espresso Cart. Our own young ladies in the Roselawn PRIDE group are serving as hostesses for the reception.

Along with the exhibition, we are premiering a special video presentation of an interview with Reverend Fred Shuttlesworth about the role of nonviolence in the American Civil Rights Movement. Reverend Shuttlesworth, a living legend known nationally and internationally, was interviewed in August by Dr. Habtu Ghebre-Ab, of UC/Clermont, and a Roselawn resident.

Updates From the Council Committees

<u>Beautification</u>: Several volunteers have done the chore of weed pulling at the Rosecliff intersection, making things considerably better looking there. Special mention should be made of Gary Moffett and Bob Ingberg. Gary did an outstanding job of pulling the weeds from the Rite-Aid property planting mounds which had been overwhelmed before flower seeds could be planted. Thanks to his efforts, and those of Dan Joyner in planting cannas, there is color in the empty lot. Bob Ingberg performed a breath-taking transformation on the Arches. Ed Moser, our Beautification chair would like to note that our last community council meeting produced only one volunteer to help with beautification chores. Outside of the considerable help coming from a few of the Council Trustees, there must be more individuals who care about our community's appearance. Is there anyone reading this newsletter who would be willing to help tend flower beds and/or pick up trash while walking? <u>Litter</u>: Great American Clean up – Saturday, October 23, 10:00 - Noon. It's time for the annual Roselawn clean up and many volunteers are needed. Please mark your calendar NOW and plan to help. We will be meeting at the Roselawn Library at 10:00 a.m. and fan out in teams to pick up litter and trash at our neighborhood's biggest "eyesores." All you need is comfortable clothes and study shoes. Gloves, bags and trash pics will be available. Wouldn't it be wonderful if everyone in our community deposited their litter and trash in the bins and receptacles provided in our business district and on residential streets? Let's all join together in this effort, show our respect for one another, and our shared pride in Roselawn.

Education: From Leonard Kirschner, representative to the LSDMC at the Roselawn Condon and Shroder Paideia. (LSDMC is a committee that enables parents, community representatives, teachers and non-teacher employees to plan for better education for school children. For instance, if there is a principal vacancy it is the LSDMC that will name a new principal subject to approval by the Board of Education and administrators. Shroder Paideia's new principal is Ms. Yenetta Harper, a dynamic lady with energy and ideas to lead the school into a top 7-12 grade position. Roselawn Condon has shown gradual upgrading and improvement in proficiency scores and will put extra effort into upgrading the 7th and 8th grade classes to college prep. As reported at the last RCC meeting the Board of Education has determined to close Losantiville School. It has not been determined where these students will attend school in the 2005-2006 school year. One rumor has students from Golf Manor and Roselawn, east of Reading Rd. going to Roselawn Condon. This issue will be discussed at the LSDMC meetings at Roselawn Condon this fall. As of now the Roselawn Condon LSDMC has not heard how many children will come, how this will affect class sizes, and whether or not Roselawn Condon will be assigned extra teaching staff. Be sure to come to the community council meeting to hear the latest report on what is happening at Roselawn Condon.


